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Apolytikion: The image of God, was faithfully preserved in you, O Father. For you took up the Cross and followed Christ. By Your actions you taught us to look beyond the flesh for it passes, rather to be concerned about the soul which is immortal. Wherefore, O Holy Benedict, your soul rejoices with the angels.


Kontakion: O sun that shinest with the Mystic Dayspring's radiance, who didst enlighten the monastics of the western lands, thou art worthily the namesake of benediction; do thou purge us of the filth of passions thoroughly by the sweat of thine illustrious accomplishments, for we cry to thee: Rejoice, O thrice-blessed Benedict.

This Saint, whose name means "blessed," was born in 480 in Nursia, a small town about seventy miles northeast of Rome. He struggled in asceticism from his youth in deserted regions, where his example drew many who desired to emulate him. Hence, he ascended Mount Cassino in Campania and built a monastery there. The Rule that he gave his monks, which was inspired by the writings of Saint John Cassian, Saint Basil the Great, and other Fathers, became a pattern for monasticism in the West; because of this, he is often



called the first teacher of monks in the West. He reposed in 547.

A story about Commitment, Faith, and Sacrifice

I would like to tell you a true story. A story about commitment, faith, and sacrifice. About five years ago, a young Muslim from a pious Muslim family and the son of an imam, an Islam clergy, left his village in West Java for Central Java to look for a job, but he could not find any. He was alone, no friends, no family, and he was searching for any job he could find, but still he could not find one. One day he met a Christian and he was invited to a Bible study. He came and he asked many questions about Christianity and the differences between the Christian faith and the Islam faith. It is usually uncommon for a Muslim to come to a Christian Bible study.

Not long after the event of the Bible study he told the priest that he wanted to be baptized a Christian. The priest was happy but at the same time he was worried. For a Muslim to become a Christian is a great offense against their God, and he must be killed according to Islamic law. So the priest gave him instructions on the Christian faith, Tradition, and dogmas. Later on he was baptized with the name of Photius.

Then he went home to tell his family that he converted into Christianity. And you can imagine what happened next. His father became very angry. He took a knife and went after Photius, but his brother saved him and told him to leave immediately. He left and never came back. Now he is married and lives in East Java. He lost his entire family because he decided to follow Christ. His only family is us the Orthodox Christians who love him and care for him. His is not richer than before but he is a faithful Christian who is building his richness in heaven. He now helps the missionary work in East Java.

To follow Christ is to be his disciple and his witness. To be the witness of Christ is not easy, it takes a lot of patience, discipline, and determination. We witness our faith through our lives and actions. Through our lives and our actions we demonstrate our beliefs as Christians. There are many things that we can do. We can visit our friends, our neighbor, or any body who are sick in the hospital. Maybe on a certain day we can collect non perishable foods and donate them to the soup kitchen, or we can volunteer ourselves to help in the soup kitchen. We can collect our old clothes that are still good, clean them and donate them to the Salvation Army, for example. We can do many things to help the poor, the hungry, the sick, the naked, the weak.

Christ is the best example of sacrificing oneself for others. Christ's sacrifice was not an object that you can buy or sell, but a sacrifice of self so that through his death he gives life to all. Brothers and sisters be the true followers of Christ. For as adopted children of God through our baptism, we are one family, one body, one community in Christ.

A SOLUTION FOR OUR UNREPENTANT HEARTS



"Our greatly sinful life and unrepentant disposition do thou forestall through thy compassion, O Lord; beside Thee we know none other, O thou that has dominion over life and death: save us, as thou art the lover of mankind." (Troparion on Friday in the First Week of Lent).

When we are spiritually sick, we ask God for healing. As it is sometimes with medication for physical ailments, it is possible that we too wonder if we will ever receive healing that will make us feel better and become better as God's children.

And sometimes we do doubt because we tend to fall into the same foolish sins day after day. We wonder if we have ever really repented. If we have these feelings, then we are thinking correctly, but without the sure knowledge that the Lord will save those whom He loves and that the resurrection will make one capable of total change.

It is correct to know that we sin every day; that we tend to be lazy, and forgetful, and insincere. We mean something one minute, and contradict ourselves by our actions the next.

But we have a solution for us: The abyss of God's mercy.

Remember, mercy is not only that God will not punish us, if we repent. If this was all, we would all fall into the pit, since we are not truly repentant. God's mercy will help us to repent. This change does not occur right away, but only with arduous labor, coupled with God's grace.

So now we have an opportunity to fall before the abyss of God's mercy and beg him to "forestall" our unrepentant heart, that is, to help us change it to a repentant one, and to gain peace and knowledge, and wisdom and purity. This is our only chance, and we must be confident of this very thing, that He Who has begun a good work in us, will complete it.

Please make every effort to come and receive the grace of Penance this Lenten Period.
